Looking back on 2006...

2006 marked another great year for Wisconsin Health Fund as its' membership enjoyed maximum return on their healthcare dollars. Throughout last year, WHF served over 8,900 members from approximately 163 participating employer groups in over 10 different local unions. The Fund has paid out just under 150,000 claims within 2 provider networks that provide access to more than 1,000,000 providers throughout America. Members filled about 143,000 prescriptions with almost 63,000 filled on-site at the Fund's Pharmacy. The on-site Medical and Dental Centers, with over 90 health care professionals on staff, performed roughly 91,000 procedures.

This Issue: **Heart Health**

Most patients probably have some awareness of periodontal disease; they've heard about it through their dentist and/or hygienist and know that it is a destructive process which, if allowed to progress, can result in much more than swollen and puffy gums. It can ultimately cause the loss of teeth, as the bony support of the teeth is progressively destroyed by the disease process. While the loss of one's teeth can be devastating in itself, there are other serious concerns regarding periodontal disease.

Patients with advanced periodontal disease have elevated levels of bacteria in their blood; this blood circulates throughout the body and ends up back in the heart. The valves within the heart allow one-way flow of the blood through the heart. If these valves are damaged due to infection they can accumulate blood-borne bacteria and endocarditis (an infection of the inner most layers of the heart) may occur.

There is increasing evidence that patients with periodontal disease may have an increased risk for cardiovascular conditions such as heart attack, stroke and coronary artery disease.

Once again, the best defense is prevention. See your dental health professional on a regular basis and maintain the health of your mouth; you may save far more than your teeth...you may save your own life.

Prescription Refill Line

Please call the prescription renewal line two weeks before your prescription runs out. You can avoid going through the operator by dialing direct: 414-479-3690. Simply follow the directions for the information needed. This line is checked frequently throughout the day. If the information you leave is complete, we will not need to return your call. Remember that your physician may not be here everyday, so there may be a delay in renewing your prescription until your physician returns to the clinic.

Health Care Center introduces Triage Nurses

What does this mean you? As a patient?

A Triage Nurse will allow the Health Center to effectively and efficiently assess your specific health care needs. When you call the clinic with a healthcare concern you will speak one on one with an experienced registered nurse who will help determine your individual needs and direct you to the most appropriate department. The Triage Nurse may offer home healthcare instructions, prepare your chart for a doctor's return call, assist in appointment scheduling, or speak with your doctor directly and ultimately steer you towards the proper service.

The presence of nurse triage allows the rest of the nursing staff to assist physicians and meet the needs of the patients currently being treated. There may be times when the Triage Nurse is addressing another patient's concerns at which time you will get an opportunity to leave a voice mail. Depending on the nature or urgency of your call it will be returned as promptly as possible. Should you feel your call is urgent, dial "0" to be redirected to an operator who will direct your call to another nurse or physician. As always, if you are calling with a life-threatening emergency, hang up and dial

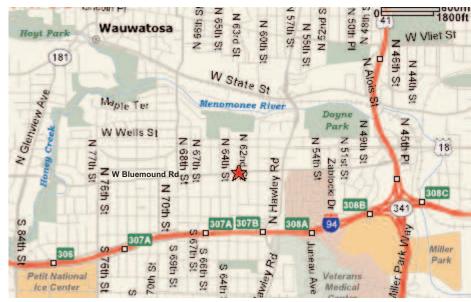
